



A slave returns to free his masters for eternity, and with them all of Christendom

In the lore that surrounds St. Patrick, the Rock of Cashel is the site of one of his many dramatic encounters. Steadying himself while baptizing King Aengus of Cashel, Patrick accidentally drives his spiked crosier through that chieftain's foot. The king makes not a murmur, and when Patrick, aghast, realizes what he has done, the king seems surprised at Patrick's concern. Given the story he had heard of a God whose feet were pierced, says the king, he assumed it was part of Christian initiation. In the twelfth century, the now-hallowed place became a Christian monastery atop the great rock.

Many historians, such as Kenneth Clark in his 1969 book *Civilization*, credit Irish monasteries in keeping the flame of learning alive. These monasteries became sanctuaries of knowledge and education, where monks diligently copied manuscripts, thus preserving vital texts during a period of widespread societal collapse in mainland Europe. Such preservation proved pivotal for the survival of Western intellectual traditions.







Alms to the poor by the Early Church

Early Christians took seriously the call of their Lord to practice love toward neighbour in the form of acts of charity. Daily distributions of food, provided from donations of the faithful, allowed churches to assuage the crushing poverty of many in an empire in decline. Such acts were viewed by authorities and nonbelievers with a sullen mixture of respect and resentment.

Lucien of Samasota, a Greek satirist, wrote of the Christians in the second century: "Their first lawgiver [Christ] persuaded them that they are all brothers... They take him for a god, accept his laws, and do without a second thought whatever he bids them. So, if a poor man needs help, they fasten their resources on him without sparing anything."

The fugitive Athanasius, pursued up the Nile by imperial soldiery, has ordered his crew to turn back downstream, toward Alexandria. With his head covered against the blistering sun, and detection, they pass the pursuing vessel still upbound. An officer shouts a request for information as to the bishop's whereabouts. Cunningly—and truthfully—the captain of Athanasius's ship shouts back, "He is not far." The pursuers redoubled their efforts to ascend the river.

This detail from Piero della Francesco's Legend of the True Cross: Battle of Heraclius and Khosrow captures the ferocity of the last battles between the Roman emperor and the ancient enemy, Persia. This detail is part of a huge fresco created by the Renaissance master for the Church of San Francesco in Arezzo, Italy.

Rediscovering ancient Chinese Christian evangelism

The barefoot emissaries of Pope Innocent IV, John Carpini and his companion Benedict, pause in their gruelling journey across the Asian steppes. Despite advanced age and the dangers of starvation, Mongol attackers and physical deprivations, these zealous Franciscans persevered to reach the court of the great Khan, there to discover Chinese Christianity long established.

800 years later Jesuit missionaries discovered that Nestorian Christian influence in China existed as early as the Tang Dynasty (618–907 AD), as evidenced by the Xi'an Stele of 781 AD which documents 150 years of early Christianity in China (inset).

From Child Bride to Saint: Elizabeth of Hungary, Heroine of the Poor

In 1211 a four-year-old girl was sent to be raised as the bride of Thuringia's next ruler, Ludwig IV, landgrave of Thuringia, then eleven. This little girl, although known to history as St. Elizabeth of Hungary, would spend most of her life in Germany, where many would regard her as the greatest woman of the German Middle Ages. They were wed in 1221, when Elizabeth was fourteen and Ludwig twenty-one. Ludwig died in 1227 of the malady that struck down the Sixth Crusade.

A Franciscan master demanded spiritual exercises from her that were harsh even for the mendicant orders, took her children away and subjected her to physical punishments. Elizabeth nevertheless strove to complete a Franciscan hospital. Becoming a heroine to the poor by the time she died of exhaustion at age 24, her grave soon became a popular place of pilgrimage.



Eruli Erulo's magnificent painting of the Sicilian Vespers is seen below. An unplanned yet spectacularly coordinated assault on their French overlords was carried out by the Sicilians on Easter Monday, March 30, 1282, after a French sergeant went too far with a bride on her wedding day and was promptly killed by the groom.

The rebellion spread quickly across the island, resulting in the massacre of thousands of French. The revolt's name, "Sicilian Vespers," refers to the timing of the initial uprising, which took place during the evening vespers service. It led to the intervention of Peter III of Aragon, triggering the War of the Sicilian Vespers which played a crucial role in reshaping Mediterranean geopolitics for the years to come.





As opposition to Calvin grew, crowds sang lewd songs about him outside his house at night and jeered his sermons during the day, while mobs threatened to throw him in the river. When the Bern government ordered Geneva to adopt a unified form of worship for all denominations, the resulting controversy drove Calvin from the city. After preaching a farewell sermon to his flock, depicted below in this nineteenth-century sketch, Calvin departed without money or property.

In modern contexts, this story serves as a reminder that governments and institutions need to carefully consider the balance between enforcing moral standards and preserving individual freedoms.



(Inset) The election as the first Republican U.S. president of Abraham Lincoln, photographed here as a congressman in 1846, helped spark the civil war, which began in 1861 when Confederate forces attacked Fort Sumter, South Carolina. Beginning life as a skeptic, Lincoln clearly believed in God later in life, but never belonged to a church.

Lincoln's description of the Bible after he was presented with one by a group of former slaves in 1864 certainly suggests a degree of faith well beyond the nominal:"In regard to this great book, I have but to say, it is the best gift God has given to man. All the good the Savior gave to the world was communicated through this book. But for it we could not know right from wrong. All things most desirable for man's welfare, here and hereafter, are to be portrayed in it."



Christian twentieth-century thirst for the miraculous and a return to the Book of Acts

Pentacostalism grew out of the belief by those in the late nineteenth-century holiness movement, notably Kansan faith-healer Charles Parham (inset left), that the movement was losing its vigour, becoming too intellectual, and no longer possessed its original miraculous powers. Accordingly, Parham established a Bible school for young missionaries in an empty Topeka mansion called Stone's Folly. His students included William Seymour (inset right), who launched the Azusa Street Revival in Los Angeles, the first Pentecostal church at which parishioners fainted and spoke in tongues during services, drawing ridicule from such quarters as the Los Angeles Daily Times.

From its inauspicious beginnings just over a century ago, Pew Research calls Pentacostalism the fastest growing denomination and now estimates over a half a billion Christians consider themselves either Pentecostal or Charismatic.





How one man's suffering and search for truth led a jaded journalist to Christ

The second and considerably more devastating Ukrainian famine in 1932-33 came solely as a result of Soviet collectivization and antikulak policies, and would be concealed by a Soviet regime intent on impressing the world through a facade of Marxist prosperity.

Pulitzer-winning *New York Times* correspondent Walter Duranty (inset right), who denied the extent of Soviet starvation, was later found to be working for the Soviets and fired. *Manchester Guardian* correspondent Malcolm Muggeridge (inset left) called Duranty from the start "the greatest liar I've met in fifty years of journalism." Muggeridge's articles were buried by *Guardian* editors, prompting him to write independently on the atrocities, but his work gained little attention. After his son's death, a suicide attempt, and the USSR's collapse, the truth emerged. In his final years, Muggeridge, once a staunch atheist, became a Christian, writing that "Christ is alive."
